Speaker: Jesse Allen

Title: "The Importance of Non-Violence in our Daily Lives and Society at Large."

Summary: Yoga is a philosophy and practice that has over 3,000 years of history. It is not just a bunch of balance and flexibility exercises but more importantly is a way of life. The most comprehensive text on yoga is the "Yoga Sutras of Patanjali." In it, Patanjali clearly spells out the guiding principles and practices of the yogic lifestyle. This way of life is informed by the Yamas and Niyamas, which translate to abstinences and observances. The first of these abstinences is called Ahimsa and means non-violence. We will look at some of the ways that we are violent in our words, thoughts or deeds (most of the time without being aware of it). In addition, we will talk about how we can be less violent and avoid the negative karma that comes from the small acts of violence that almost all of us commit regularly.

Mr. Allen is a Master's Level special educator. He owns his own business in Edwardsville where he teaches social-emotional learning to children and adults. He

currently is president of a local non-profit called Edwardsville Unity which works to promote racial, religious, and cultural harmony.



Report to the Congregation from Church President Alex Hoeft


This month has been my first month as the new president of the congregation. We


Social Justice for the Rest of Us: When You Want to Change the World, But Aren't a Protester.

Based in part (and going beyond) the book Social Justice for the

Sensitive Soul: How to Change the World in Quiet Ways by **Dorcas Cheng-Tozun**, this 3 part class will examine a wide variety of ways to engage in social justice work that integrates your specific physical, mental, and emotional capacity; your personality; and your skills. The first two sessions will discuss what social justice can look like beyond protests and direct advocacy, and the final session will include recommendations for ways to volunteer in the local community based on your specific traits.

The Bible for Liberal Religious **People**



For too long UUs and other liberal religious

people have ignored or downplayed the Bible, leaving it for the extreme right to use and abuse. With the rise of Christian Nationalism, this has become dangerous ignorance for us. Whether or not you use the Bible as sacred for your spiritual path, knowing what it really says, and how it has changed and evolved over time, can give you tools to combat rising Christian extremism.

In this class students will learn the following:

The history and development of the Bible Canon itself, including the variety of texts that comprise

what is considered Scripture by various Jewish and Christian sects, and the texts that were left out.

- 1. The various ways these texts have been interpreted by Jewish and Christian leaders over the centuries, within various historical contexts.
- 2. The rise of Historical-Critical method and how that changed the way the Bible was interpreted and understood.
- 3. The impact of various sciences on biblical interpretation and the ongoing adaptations for progressive Judaism and Christianity based on these impacts.
- 4. How to exegete and interpret Biblical texts in context, with specific attention given to the 'hot topics' of women in ministry, abortion, LGBTQIA equality, and salvation.
- 5. How to use the Bible (with its flaws and problems) as part of our spiritual heritage as progressive religious people.

This is a year-long series (1-2 classes each month) BUT each of the above topics is a mini-module, so if you can't make them all you can pick the topics you prefer and just attend those 1-2 sessions. Will start in October on Zoom.


